Purpose

Administrative Council oversees teams, provides accountability, facilitates communication between teams and keeps LMUMC focused on our G.R.O.W. objectives of Gathering to worship, Remembering to study, Opening ourselves to serve and Witnessing as disciples of Jesus Christ.

Ministry Activities, Special Events and Missions

It's been an active year here at LMUMC! Administrative Council worked as a team this year to initiate a Vision Team, working with guidance from Pastor Edwin Vargas and with conference support to lay out our goals for the next 3-5 years. We reaffirmed our inclusion statement and revamped the flow of Sunday morning worship and education along with regular ministry activities.

Blessings, Accomplishments, and Commendations

We've had some wonderful program enhancements and adjustments this year at LMUMC. Through a multi-team effort from Sandy Whisler, Wendy Radloff, Kam Perry and Pastor Edwin Vargas, we restructured our Sunday morning flow toward the goal of a relevant, meaningful, multigenerational worship so that families begin Sunday morning worship together and then Children's Church begins after children's message. We renewed our commitment to a children's sermon and adult bible study and Pastor Edwin Vargas has provided profound spiritual leadership for members of all ages from the pulpit, in bible study, during children's sermon time and beyond.

Under the leadership of our SPRC chair, Russ Roedl, we added a capable nursery coordinator, Amber Turfle, who provides consistent care to our youngest members. Our youth program continues to build momentum under the leadership of Kam Perry. Kam orchestrated a retreat-style confirmation program, led our youth on a summer mission trip experience, coordinated a youth-led Vacation Bible School along with mid-week programming while staying under budget. Our finance team continues to steward our resources well and fun ministries under the capable leadership of Dave Hornickel and we offered another session of Financial Peace University, led by Matt and Amy Hanson. By the time this report is read, we should be nearly complete with our Shared Giving, a priority for our congregation.

Our Mission Team, led by Amy Hanson, and Camping Coordinator, Val Stark, ran a fundraising campaign, resulting in several of our elementary and middle school students attending church camp on scholarship. In missional giving, we supported Milwaukee Children's Services and Midwest Distribution Center, with guest speakers from both, along with a balance of local, regional and international giving. We hosted two Children's Clothing Giveaways and our garage sale for our community. Brianna Behselich and the welcome team have energized our commitment to welcoming guests and have put literature and efforts in place to support that goal. Our Teddy Bear preschool program, under the leadership of Michelle Quednow, adjusted fees to improve the well-being of our teachers and maintain a financially sound program.

We are working well as an administrative team, serving well beside one another and seeking God's guidance for our next steps as we embrace the visioning process. We've taken time to review our historical items, cemetery records and artifacts to determine what will be featured in a future historical display. We are releasing things that must be decommissioned to honor our space. We've added new technology in our office to support the gifts of our office administrator, Mallory Hines, who continues to bless us with her many talents. We are investing in an AED system and completed our fire alarm project to make our campus safer. We are considering CPR training and other safe sanctuary trainings for our congregation.

Volunteer Opportunities

Using a google survey, we have assessed the gifts and joy areas of willing members. During the fall nominations season, we fill vacancies and ensure that leaders are feeling supported and serving within their strength areas based on that feedback. We provide our leaders with a detailed list of who is willing to volunteer in specific areas so volunteers can be put to work for ministry here at LMUMC. There are ample volunteer opportunities on every committee at LMUMC and our leaders have been wonderful with suggestions for appropriate candidates.

Concerns/Special Needs

We are working to be active in missions in a greater way, become a more welcoming congregation to our guests and support our youth programming with greater grace. Because we host many outside groups who meet in our building, including our Teddy Bear Preschool, we are always seeking ways to reach out to the people who come through our doors beyond Sunday mornings. Our vision team will begin work in October, 2019, to determine future vision and possible space adjustments for our ministries.

Worship Team

Purpose

The Worship Team has a focus on the "G" of our G.R.O.W. statement - Gather to Worship. The team coordinates the ministries that support worship and assures that we have what is needed for our worship services to run smoothly.

Ministry Activities, Special Events and Missions

- 1. The Calvary Men Quartet performed during the Worship Service on Sunday, April 28, and then presented a concert for the community in the afternoon.
- 2. The Outdoor Worship Service and Picnic took place on Sunday, July 21. The weather cooperated and the event was once again a great success. The date has already been set for 2020.
- 3. On Sunday, August 25, children were invited to bring their backpacks to church for a "Blessing of the Backpacks".
- 4. The Live Nativity will take place on Monday, December 23. The Worship Team assists with costuming and refreshments.
- 5. Throughout the year, the Worship Team coordinates special observances. From Palm Sunday and Easter, to Confirmation and Graduation Sundays, to Worldwide Communion, All Saints Day, Advent and Christmas, the team works together and with Pastor Edwin to plan meaningful worship services.

Blessings, Accomplishments, and Commendations

- 1. Completed the design of a set of white liturgical paraments.
- 2. Hired a Nursery Coordinator who provides childcare in the Nursery each Sunday along with one volunteer.
- 3. Revised parts of our worship service to be faithful stewards of our worship time.
- 4. Implemented a Children's Time each Sunday to increase attendance of children and their families in Worship.
- 5. Coordinated faithful volunteers for every Sunday greeters, ushers, fellowship hosts, acolytes, liturgists, tech booth operators, nursery attendants, and communion stewards.

Volunteer Opportunities

- Welcome greeter Welcome members and visitors as they arrive, creating a warm and hospitable entrance.
- Fellowship host Serve coffee, juice, and snack as people fellowship, deepen relationships, and welcome visitors.
- Usher Greet those who enter the sanctuary, hand out bulletins, collect the offering, and assist with Communion.
- Liturgist Assist the pastor in worship by reading liturgy, scripture, and leading prayers.
- Acolyte Carry the light of Christ into the church and light the altar candles as we begin worship, and extinguish the altar candles and carry the light of Christ out into the world as we leave. Open to those in grades 2 - 5.
- Tech Team Run the equipment necessary to project on the screens before and during the worship service.
- Nursery Coordinator Work with the Nursery staff to coordinate volunteer attendants for each Sunday.
- Communion steward Prepare the elements - juice representing the blood of Christ and bread representing the body of Christ - when Communion is celebrated on the first Sunday of the month.



Concerns/Special Needs

- 1. We are continually evaluating our worship time and making revisions and updates to create worship opportunities that engage and inspire people of all ages.
- 2. We strive to create a variety of worship experiences to reach the members of our congregation as well as members of our community.

Purpose

Ministry Activities, Special Events and Missions

As we strive to welcome those interested in finding a church, we help organize events in which the public can attend i.e. garage sale and chili supper. The garage sale food this year made \$717.69. We updated our church brochure and attached a small gift card to it for new guests. Our team signs and sends holiday cards to all of our shut-ins. A "Happy Anniversary" email is sent to each couple for their anniversary. The Welcome Team sponsored the banner for the Town and Country Parade. We are trying to keep people connected both community members and our congregation.

Blessings, Accomplishments, and Commendations

As the co-chair, I am very grateful for our team members. The veterans are a wealth of knowledge and the new members this year have had some good insight and ideas. We have had a lot of compliments with the new tasks we have taken on. Our office secretary, Mallory, did a fabulous job of designing our brochure and there were many people at the garage sale who commented on how bright and colorful it was. We have received numerous emails in regards to the Happy Anniversary emails being such a kind gesture. Our team does a great job in thinking outside the box to G.R.O.W. our church.

Volunteer Opportunities

We encourage our congregation to serve through their time, talents, and/or monetary donations. We were involved with the Lake Mills Children's Clothing Giveaway greeting and take down, the new Shut-In Visitation Program, donating food for the homeless meal, donating food or delivering food to our shut-ins for the Harvest Meal, and making food, serving, or cleaning up at the Community Meal. We strive to make our church narthex a comfortable and welcoming place for fellowship. This is done by volunteers on our team changing the décor for each season or holiday. One of our members donated the glass table tops to allow the church goers to place their refreshments on the table without fear of ruining the table clothes. Another team member purchased and made some of our center pieces for the table tops.

Concerns/Special Needs

We would like to see growth within our church, more regular attendance with members and youth, and ways to stay connected with all members. We are continually thinking about ways to bring in new members and help them find a place in our ministry once they have joined. We have many members who are shutins, "snow birds," or college students who we would like to keep connected while they are physically away from our church. We want our church to be connected, even through the generations.

Future Ministry

As we look to the future, our goals are to continue welcoming guests. These guests are potentially our newest members. We would like to put together a New Member program, including a folder, class, party, and mentor program to pair them with a current member of the same demographic. To help our members be the most successful at serving we have discussed a spiritual gifts survey to guide members or show them their strengths. We would like to focus on connecting our members by events that allow all member to attend and enjoy each other's comradery. Caroling and an End of the Summer Bash were two thoughts to bring this to life.

Missions Team

Purpose

To support local, county, state, national and international missions through:

- Establishing a thoughtful vision and develop the ministry in accordance with that vision
- Increase congregational participation in world missions
- Aid members of the local church in responding to God's call to missions
- Prepare the annual missions budget and present it for approval
- · Visit areas of priority or focus of the church
- Develop policy and procedures related to the ministry

Ministry Activities, Special Events and Missions

Some key achievements of the LM United Methodist Church include:

- Hosting a harvest meal attended by 78 people with additional take-outs delivered to shut-ins.
- Coordinating a "Giving Tree" for Jefferson County Human Services to collect pajamas, slippers, socks and clothing for people in need.
- Participated in the Samaritan's Purse Christmas ShoeBox Ministry sending 34 boxes of gifts and supplies to youth in underdeveloped countries and to spread the Gospel to new areas of the world
- · Provided Christmas gifts to the local nursing home
- Annually host a church Rummage Sale which raised \$1960 this year, which was a \$300 increase from last year. The funds supported the youth mission trip and camp trips.
- Continue to increase the use of the SCRIPS program. Proceeds are donated towards mission needs including the Northcott Neighborhood House, Harbor House Crisis Shelter, Building Cambodia, Red Bird Mission, UMCOR International Disaster Response and United Methodist Children's Services.
- Provided a monthly loose coin donation that supported multiple UMC Programs.

Blessings, Accomplishments, and Commendations

The success and impact of the Lake Mills Mission Team continues to grow. We have made progress towards many of the conference priories. Some examples include:

- The Samaritans Purse Christmas ShoeBox ministry is sharing God's love through gifts and ministry of the gospel to people in new places.
- We continue to expand our church rummage sale and SCRIPS program which are our larger fundraisers that we use to support mission work. Proceeds also help support our church youth group to participate in a Missions project in Wyoming this past summer.
- Our partnership with the Jefferson County Health and Human Services and the Ready Kids for School program help low income and under-served youth and families receive the essentials they need.
- Rainbow Covenant We are on track to become a Rainbow Covenant church.

We recognize that an area of opportunity for us is to engage in multicultural ministry. Our church membership is largely Caucasian.

Volunteer Opportunities

The Missions Team welcomes visitors and individuals who would like to serve and share their talents to reach the needs of others both inside and outside of the church.

Concerns/Special Needs

To achieve a congregation that is vital, healthy and vibrant in ten years, our congregation will need to consist of members that span the age spectrum from young to old. Our church programs and outreach will continue to grow and strengthen our members' relationship with Jesus. As our relationship with Jesus grows, and our understanding of the gifts, talents and direction becomes more clear, the generosity of our congregation will continue to grow, and the love we express towards others will clearly be evident in the eyes of the non-believer. They will know we are Christians by our Love!

During much of 2019 we lost the ability to give brief updates and reminders at the beginning of the service about loose coin offerings and Missional updates. This appears to have led to a decline in collections and impact that we can have outside our walls. We will need to continue to evaluate how to keep our membership informed while respecting the desire of others to be out of church within an hour. We need to balance this with respect to our team members who already put in quite a bit of time on our projects and adding a ministry moment to reach our members is another task on the to do list. This is something we are going to brainstorm on in 2020

Steps to help us reach the place of health and vitality as a congregation include:

- A continued emphasis on youth ministry and opportunities for youth to engage in Mission work, both locally and out of state. Experiences like these provide youth and the congregation to observe God's grace and observe his redemptive plan in action
- The Mission's Team will continue to strive to grow collections to support a variety of mission work locally, in-state, out of state and globally.

Future Ministry

- We continue to give thought and prayer to seek out and responding to needs in our own congregation (families who struggle or elderly members).
- We are exploring the opportunity to sponsor a Missionary who could occasionally visit our
 congregation and share reports of the impact they are making. Having that direct connection as a
 congregation would grow our awareness of the work in the Mission's field, and humanize the work
 even more than just sending donations to a missions group.
- We welcome and hope to recruit a youth to serve on our team.

Purpose

The Trustees oversee, maintain and supervise all local church property.

Ministry Activities, Special Events and Missions

- We replaced the existing fire alarm system and added annunciation devices in our worship space.
 Having a code compliant fire alarm system impacts our entire congregation and probably more so, the public that uses our facility.
- We purchased an AED and installed it in the Nartex.
 On-site AEDs have been proven to increase survival odds on individuals in cardiac arrest.
- We computerized information for those buried at Salem Cemetery and updated our fee policies.

Blessings, Accomplishments, and Commendations

Dan Hornickel was instrumental in computerizing the Salem Cemetery documents. He spent many hours pouring over old documents and cross referencing them. He also created a new computerized map of the cemetery using Excel. Rick Sapp and family scanned the old burial permits and death certificates, so those files are also available electronically. Baylei and Devin Crenshaw made list of those buried for Dan's use from using on-line resources.

Special thanks to Kam and the youth who performed the spring clean-up as a fundraiser for their mission trip.

Volunteer Opportunities

We are planning on trying to keep our weeds under control next year by having our members volunteer to weed a section. Marian Timmerman graciously offered to spearhead this project.

Concerns/Special Needs

Our accessibility audit revealed some deficiencies. We will be looking for guidance on prioritizing improvements to make our building more handicap accessible.

Future Ministry

Our vision is for a code-compliant, accessible, energy efficient building. LED lighting and accessibility improvements will be our focus for the near future. While we continue to hope for code compliant restrooms, this cannot be achieved within our existing building footprint.





Finance Team

Purpose:

The purpose of the Finance Committee is to review the financial status of LMUMC by overseeing reports and balances of all funds and holdings. Verify through an annual audit that all funds balance and accounts are paid in full or as needed. Keep the church body aware of our financial status and obligations and needs as they arise.

Blessing and Accomplishments:

- 1) Continue to promote the additional methods for giving that have been instituted for all congregational members to participate in. A member can go online through our website and give electronically through their bank account or they can load an app reader onto their cell phone and give to LMUMC.
- 2) Financial Peace University, a 9 week course on financial guidance, led by presenter Dave Ramsey, was offered during the spring months to our church members and also opened to the citizens of Lake Mills, regardless of religious affiliation. Several family units from outside of LMUMC did participate.

Work of Our Congregation

LMUMC participates in Feeding the Homeless once every two months—six times a year. This is a program operated in Madison that feeds 75-125 homeless men and women at Grace Episcopal Church on the square by the capitol.

During the months of April and May, a 9-week financial educational course entitled Financial Peace University was presented. 5 different family units participated to learn how best to "own their own money". Several units were nonmembers.

LMUMC provides a meal, if requested, immediately after a funeral or memorial service to the surviving friends and family members of the deceased. This year 4 meals were served in a short few months. The meal is served by volunteer workers and many members contribute a salad or desert. Many attending are from the community and out of town.

Lastly, every 2 months our church is asked to help provide food or labor for the Lake Mills community meal which is held at the EMS building every 3rd Wednesday of the month. This meal is open to all and serves many residences of various ages and income levels.

10 Year Vision

LMUMC will be financially stable with many members presenting offerings between 5 and 10 % of their income. Legacy gifts will also be a part of the financial plan. We will be able to pay Shared Giving earlier than Dec 31, will give more to Second Mile giving, UMCOR disasters will be funded better, and we will be outgrowing our current building and will be having focus groups and visioning sessions and beginning fund raising to create a usable structure.

Volunteer Opportunities

Volunteers need to come forward on projects and when needs are presented respond positively, currently about 10% of members are doing 90% of covering needs. We are also paying for too many services that the membership could provide to help save money.

Concerns

Need to find different ways to create financial awareness without making people become unconcerned. Also find ways to encourage more members to participate with their physical talents as well as their money and gifts. A desire to work closer with the Mission team to promote different opportunities for our congregation to get involved in. There is also a need to create a procedures manual as to how the monies of LMUMC are received and distributed.



Vision:

My vision as director of youth ministries for LMUMC youth is to provide an environment in which young people may grow, learn, connect, and strive toward a life of serving God. The best environment to grow in is one rooted deep in love. I want to reflect Christ's love on our youth and together reflect His love on all of those we encounter. Our youth groups will focus on discovering God and spreading the good news by living out the model set by Christ.

My goal would be for our youth to focus in on the relational side of Christ. By doing so the youth will discover who they are, who God is, and who God wants them to become.

Scope and Sequence

The idea behind a Scope and Sequence is to focus on a beginning and an end; where are the youth at? Where do we want them to end up? Each "stepping stone" in between is an aspect or theme we want them to hit on their journey from point A to point B. The scope and sequence can remain the same while the teaching points change each year, the themes stay the same.

The scope and sequence acts as the frame work of a year of ministry from k-12th grade. The scope and sequence will change as the climate and vision of the church changes but it offers a solid footing to build upon.

Children's ministry acts as an introductory course as to who God is. We introduce them to God and Jesus and move through an understanding of the characters and themes of the Bible. We touch on who Jesus is

and how we can be like him. That takes us to youth moving into middle school. Middle school are formative years where youth are critically thinking about who they are and where their identity is found. We focus on aspects of Christianity young people will cling to in the idea that their identity will be found in Christ. In high school is where we start to develop themes and understanding into practice. We explore where, we as individuals, fit into a life of serving and honoring God. We start to form their faith into something they take ownership of in the hopes of taking that with them beyond high school. The ultimate through all of this is not to make believers but Disciples of Jesus Christ

Scope and Sequence: Children's Ministry

Start: Who is God and Jesus?

- History; the power of God, our creation, and how he loves us
- God uses all kinds of people (Old Testament Characters)
- Stories of the Bible (significant themes: love, sharing, humility etc.)
- Jesus is...(explore the character of Jesus)
- How we can be like Jesus (apply themes to our lives)

Finish: Jesus loves me, I want to be more like Him

Scope and Sequence: Middle School

Start: What is the importance of a relationship with Jesus? How does it affect me?

- How can I honor the God by the way I live?
- Start putting God first before everything else
- Is God present in my relationships and people I associate with?
- How do I feel about the practices required to follow Christ?
- Am I being who God wants me to be?
- How does Jesus want me to follow him?
- What is getting in the way of my full commitment?

Finish: I will claim my Faith as my own.

Scope and Sequence: High School

Start: How do you see God; how do you perceive Him in this culture?

- Claim God as your own (begin search for identity in Christ)
- What are the trials we face and the defects in our character (Give them to God)
- Own our redemption and new identity in Christ. Put our trust in God
- Don't fear persecution, allow God to use you and become who he wants you to be
- How do we use or identity in Christ to build the kingdom
- What is holding us back from being fully committed to God
- How do we live a life of a constant witness
- Where are my gifts and how do I use them to glorify God and build the kingdom

Finish: Become Disciples of Jesus Christ



In January 2019 Pastor Dan Fahs (Good Shepherd UMC in Oconomowoc) offered to host a group of area Lay Speakers and Pastors to participate in the Peer Learning Preaching Group in the Southeast District. This group consists of local church pastors gathering monthly to focus specifically and deliberately on their preaching. Pastor Dan Fahs is a trained facilitator through Garrett-Evangelical Theological Seminary. The program focuses on topics related to helping group members to be effective preachers as we learn ways to analyze our own preaching as well as listening to the preaching of others and offering feedback that is both affirming and constructive. We met monthly throughout 2019 at Good Shepherd UMC in Oconomowoc. As part of the group meeting, we also spent time reading and reflecting on the book, "What NOT to Say - Avoiding The Common Mistakes That Can Sink Your Sermon" by John Holbert and Alyce McKenzie. We have a group of about 10 people who regularly attend the monthly meetings. Each month a person volunteers to share their message for an upcoming service. We provide constructive feedback and ideas to help improve the message that will be delivered. Overall, the program has been very worth while, uplifting and edifying.
